There are several literary and cinematic villains who are as widely recognized as The Harry Potter Lord Voldemort. And just like Riddle used cunning manoeuvres to outsmart his professors, as did the actor who played him. I really enjoyed doing this scene with Richard Harris where I pretend to be a model student... while really lying to him, says Coulson. It reminded me of a lot of my experience at boarding school - being impeccably well behaved on the street and secretly getting up to evil. But don't be fooled, Coulson identifies with only some of the Dark Lord's features. After all, Voldemort is a monster. There's a lot that doesn't look like us, but I felt like I understood something about him. What he did (as a teenager) made sense to me in terms of his survival. During the filming of Coulson, author J.K. Rowling has released only four Harry Potter books. Because of this, the British actor was able to use his imagination to fill in some gaps about his character. From the information that was in these four books, it seemed to me that his evil was a cold and emotional absence, and that's what I was interested in exploring. With JK Rowling offering new books and films that fit into the Harry Potter universe, it's hoped audiences can get to dive even deeper into hole that the Lord twisted psyche. The cultural phenomenon comes to an end with the release of the last film, Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows: Part II, at midnight in this but the influence of Rowling's world can hardly be considered more. After all, getting children's children to read -- millions of them -- it's no small feat. As a trading partner at the Barrett Book Store in Darien, Connecticut, 70-year-old Dottie Brush knows firsthand the series' unique ability to inspire young readers. We'd hand them a book and there would be 20 kids sitting on the floor starting it already. By the time the next one was ready, they had read it 3 or 4 times. My kid can't read, but listens to audio books non-stop. She knows all about it and took this crazy dictionary. Now the entire series has been released and a new, younger audience is picking up Potter's books. These new readers don't come of age with Harry, as their predecessors did, maturing over a decade with the main character. They can read books after book without downtime.
